


- 1. Lost opportunities
- 2. Unnecessary stress
- 3. Loss of confidence
- 4. Slave to twisted perceptions
- 5. Faith not exercised

Five Reasons Not to Fear Failure


- 1. Failure can be a growth experience
- 2. Failure's aftermath is seldom as devastating as feared
- 3. Failure can be managed
- 4. Failure can open unexpected doors
- 5. Failure cannot separate us from the love and grace of God.

Fear in the Bible

- 1. Fear is the first human emotion mentioned in Scripture, a result of the fall of Adam & Eve (Gen. 3: 10)
- 2. The fear of God is the only "sanctioned" fear in the Bible.
- 3. Fear is portrayed as faith's antithesis.
- 4. Fear is often the door to disobedience and rebellion against God.

A list of Abraham Lincoln's Failures

- Lost job, 1832
- Defeated for legislature, 1832
- Failed in business, 1833
- Elected to legislature, 1834 defeated for Speaker, 1838
- Sweetheart (Ann Rutledge) died, 1835
- Had nervous breakdown, 1836
- Defeated for nomination for Congress, 1843
- Elected to Congress, 1846 Lost renomination, 1848
- Rejected for Land Officer, 1849
- Defeated for Senate, 1854
- Defeated for nomination for Vice-President, 1856
- Again defeated for Senate, 1858
- Elected President, 1860

The Man in the Arena

Excerpt from a speech by Theodore Roosevelt
"Citizenship In A Republic"
delivered at the Sorbonne, in Paris, France on 23 April, 1910

It is not the critic who counts; not the man who points out how the strong man stumbles, or where the doer of deeds could have done them better. The credit belongs to the man who is actually in the arena, whose face is marred by dust and sweat and blood; who strives valiantly; who errs, who comes short again and again, because there is no effort without error and shortcoming; but who does actually strive to do the deeds;

who knows great enthusiasms, the great devotions; who spends himself in a worthy cause; who at the best knows in the end the triumph of high achievement, and who at the worst, if he fails, at least fails while daring greatly, so that his place shall never be with those cold and timid souls who neither know victory nor defeat.

By the way...

In 1912, two years after he made this speech, Theodore Roosevelt ran for President of the United States and lost.

"I have missed more than 9,000 shots in my career. I have lost almost 300 games. On 26 occasions I have been entrusted to take the game winning shot, and I missed. I have failed over and over and over again in my life. And that is why I succeed."
